Sustainable Development Fund: Annual Report 2013/14 Report by Administrator, Sustainable Development Fund Panel

Summary: This report provides a summary of the work of the Sustainable

Development Fund during 2013/14, including details of the 20 projects which were supported by the Fund during the year.

Recommendation: That the report be noted.

- 1. This report covers the year 2013/2014 which is the final year of the Sustainable Develoment Fund. The Authority agreed at its March meeting that with the latest round of Governemnt cuts it could no longer support the Fund. The SDF has been very successful over the past 12 years in providing grants to many organisations and it will be sadly missed. A celebration event will take place on the 30 July to mark the end of the Fund and this will include a review of the whole scheme since its launch.
- 2. The number of projects awarded a grant in the year was 20 with a total grant allocation of £144,819. In addition two projects that had been awarded three year grants were awarded the final years grants amounting to £17,663. The projects were very varied from GPS monitors to give actual speed on day boats to reintroducing rush harvesting on the River Waveney. A full listing of the 20 projects approved for grant in 2013/14 can be found in Appendix I. - 3. The following gives an overview of the SDF activities for 2013/14 (the figures in brackets are those for 2012/2013):
 - 43 applications received (28):
 - 20 projects supported (21);
 - £144,819 total funding (£153,743)
 - £263,761 match funding (£221,413);
 - £7,240.95 average grant awarded (£7,321); and
 - 13 projects completed and signed off (29).

The match funding represents a multiplier of 1.82 to 1 for the SDF grant given.

The number of applications was a large increase on the previous year perhaps a reflection of the fewer grant funds available and less monies to award. The match funding overall (as a % of the grant) was greater than the previous year for the projects supported although there were two projects with

- high match funding and if these are excluded the figure reduces to 0.81 and gives an average grant of 58% of the total project costs.
- 4. The grants given in the year amounted to £144,819, a decrease from the previous year and used some of the monies carried over from the previous year. The Broads Authority allocated £150,000 to the SDF in 2013/2014, the same as the previous year. The administration costs for the year amounted to £15,000, which is the 10% aimed for. There is a carry-over of £9,912 to 2015/2016 to allow for the administration of signing off the outstanding projects.
- 5. The Sustainable Development Fund Panel met four times during the year in April, July, November and January. The Panel is made up of eleven members comprising one member of the Broads Authority, one member of the Broads Forum, representing the wider Broads community; four independent members, representing business and the voluntary sector; a representative from the Defra, RDPE delivery team, and three young people.
- 6. In line with the main Authority, the Panel has adopted the use of electronic papers and minutes for its meetings, and encouraged applicants to submit their applications electronically. The SDF pages on the Broads Authority web site give details of the scheme including the criteria, guidance and application form. The web site also gives dates of meetings, closing dates for applications and a full list of projects supported.
- 7. The Sustainable Development Fund has once again had a successful year in that it provided grants to a wide variety of organisations within the Broads, meeting the Defra objectives set for the Fund and providing a good spread of projects across the Defra indicators. Education figures highly in the projects for not just main stream but a number of projects targeting those vulnerable or not in employment. Projects associated with boating, conservation and promoting urban/rural links figure highly providing enjoyment and increased understanding of the Broads environment. The feedback from all the projects has been very positive in that the support of the SDF has been a major contributor to the projects going ahead. Applicants welcome the 'soft-touch' approach and the average grant award of 58% shows good value for money from the SDF grant.
