Re: Broads Local Plan Sustainability Appraisal Objectives - focused consultation

I am writing to you to consult with you on minor changes to two Sustainability Appraisal Objectives for the Broads Local Plan.

Please note that we have already scoped the SA and you have seen the Interim SA.

Which SA Objectives would we like to change?

SOC6: To improve the quality, range and accessibility of community services and facilities. ENV10: To achieve the highest quality of design that is innovative, imaginable, and sustainable and reflects local distinctiveness.

Why do we want to change the SA Objectives?

After using the SA Objectives at the first stage of producing the Local Plan and also using them in relation to assessing flood risk, it has become apparent that two of the SA Objectives could be improved to be clearer in their wording as well as more consistent with the NPPF. In particular SOC6 as worded could only be applied to the provision of new services rather than assessing the location of a site and its accessibility to existing services.

What are the changes?

ENV10: To achieve the highest quality of design that is innovative, *imaginative*, and sustainable and reflects local distinctiveness.

SOC6*a*: To improve the quality, range and accessibility of community services and facilities SOC6*b*: To ensure new development is sustainability located with good access by means other than a private car to a range of community services and facilities.

Changes to the SA Framework.

Please note that there is no change to ENV10.

For SOC6a and b, no new decision making criteria have been added, but the questions moved to relate to the two SOC6 objectives.
