## Strategic priorities- update

#### Purpose

This report sets out the latest progress in implementing the Authority's annual strategic priorities for 2021/22.

### 1. Introduction

- 1.1. Each year the Broads Authority identifies a small set of strategic priorities, which focus on projects that have high resource needs or a very large impact on the Broads, or that are politically sensitive. Setting these priorities helps target the Authority's resources and make the most of partnership working and external funding opportunities. Priorities are set each financial year, although some large-scale projects carry across several years.
- 1.2. The latest update on our agreed strategic priorities for 2021/22 is in Table 1.

	Works are ongoing at Mutton's Mill, Halvergate. Students from City College Norwich have begun to return to site to gain experience in heritage construction. We are awaiting the result of our applications with East Suffolk, South Norfolk and Broadland District Councils for the installation of Changing Places toilet facilities in the Broads to improve access for local communities. In December we took delivery of our first RNIB "Map-for-All",	

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	a tactile map that allows visually impaired people to navigate with confidence around a site. We met with members of Vision Norfolk to test and trial the map at Whitlingham. Planning ongoing for Broads Hidden Heritage Festival with Scheme partners and Beccles Town Council. Legacy planning ongoing, with new legacy partners recruited to continue works beyond project funding.	

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
