Chief Executive's Report

Summary: This report summarises the current position in respect of a number of important projects and events, including any decisions taken during the recent cycle of committee meetings. It does not include matters which are already on the agenda for this meeting. Members are asked to note the report.

1 Strategic Direction

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: John Packman/Multiple

- 1.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013, the Authority considered a series of draft objectives, projects and key milestones to meet the Authority's strategic priorities for 2013/14 to deliver progress against the Broads Plan 2011. Members will be aware that, following the consultation with the Navigation Committee on 11 October 2012, that the strategic priority for dredging (reflected in Strategic Priority 2(c)1) was amended to require at least 50,000m³ of dredging in total. The Committee also suggested, during its meeting on 28 February 2013, that consideration be given to include a target to examine opportunities to extend or expand navigable water space for recreation on Hoveton Great Broad. It should be noted that Natural England is taking the lead in applying for international funding to dredge Hoveton Great Broad. The Authority will monitor developments in this project to identify opportunities in this regard. Following the incorporation of some text changes, the Authority agreed the draft objectives, projects and key milestones to meet the Authority's strategic priorities for 2013/14. The final version can be viewed on the Authority's website.
- 1.2 The Authority also reviewed how the strategic priorities over the periods 2011/12 and 2012/13 had contributed towards the strategic priorities in the Broads Plan 2011. Members are encouraged to review the more detailed and comprehensive updates on all Broads Plan 2011 objectives on the online version of the Broads Plan at www.broads-plan.co.uk

2 Biodiversity and Water Strategy

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Andrea Kelly/BD 1-6, AL2-4, CC2-4

2.1 At its meeting on 18 January 2013, the Authority adopted the Biodiversity and Water Strategy as the new way of partnership working, resource prioritisation and target setting for Biodiversity and Water work in the Broads and Broads Authority. This Strategy was formed in consultation with the two key partnerships, the Broads Biodiversity Partnership and the Water Quality Partnership. These action-focused groups report to the strategic Broads Conservation Partnership who along with the Broads Forum formed part of the consultation.

- 2.2 This strategy and associated documents is aligned with the new Government strategy on biodiversity, water and ecosystems benefits, supporting the delivery of 'Biodiversity 2020' national strategy (2011) and the EU Water Framework Directive. It has four priority areas for habitats and species, reducing pressures, improving our knowledge and putting people at the heart of biodiversity.
- 2.3 The strategy aims to provide a structure for involvement of partners beyond the conservation organisations, particularly in the wider Broadland catchment as well as making the complex set of issues more accessible.
- 2.4 The strategy will help with sharing the available evidence base to come to common decisions, ensuring that partners work on the main priorities to achieve the targets and outcomes, including the on the new national Biological Action Reporting System (BARS). Finally, the Strategy helps raise awareness of the priority gaps in resourcing. Through the various partnership groups, the Authority will seek to meet these new challenges where possible.
- 2.5 Adopting this approach further integrates biodiversity and water benefits with, land management, economic development, access improvements and health initiatives. Closer working with partner organisations, business and community groups may also lead to more joined up public sector working and consequently better environmental outcomes in the Broads.

- 3 Broads Integrated Access Strategy and Action Plan Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Adrian Clarke/TR1-3
- 3.1 At its meeting on 18 January 2013, the Authority endorsed the Broads Integrated Access Strategy and Action Plan subject to officers taking account of additional consultation responses particularly with regard to angling access.
- 3.2 The strategy aims to provide leadership and guidance on the principles that all those working towards improving access provision in the Broads should take into consideration when developing access projects. The strategy also aims to influence the local and regional policy agenda by ensuring that the benefits of recreation in the Broads are recognised in the local and regional policy framework and given adequate weight in the planning process.
- 3.3 Aside from the key objectives of the strategy the Broads Authority will use a number of additional guiding principles for project prioritisation which are set out in the document. Provided that it can be demonstrated that project proposals deliver the overarching objectives of the strategy the Broads Authority will use these to assess which access projects it is able to support and promote.

- 3.4 The strategy provides a broad framework for the development of recreational access in the Broads. The Broads Authority will play a key role in the delivery of the aims of the strategy; in part by direct delivery of projects on the ground but also by supporting and encouraging the initiatives of partners and providing guidance to community groups and local businesses. The strategy and its action plan should be seen as a living document which will evolve to take account of changing priorities, circumstances, ongoing consultation on project development and opportunities over time.
- 3.5 By adopting this approach to access management, officers hope to demonstrate that access can be successfully integrated with conservation, land management, economic development and health initiatives. Closer working with partner organisations and community groups may also lead to more joined up public sector working and consequently better access provision in the Broads.

4 Breydon Water Water Ski Zone Designation

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Trudi Wakelin/NA4.1 and 4.5

- 4.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013 the Authority considered a report on discussions concerning the implementation of the agreed water ski zone on Breydon Water.
- 4.2 Following a further meeting held with Natural England on 1 March 2013 where the assessment process was discussed, it was agreed that, if the Authority could identify the level of historic use of waterskiing on the site, and ensure that the proposed use would not exceed these levels, then it may be possible to conclude no significant adverse affect on the features of the site, and therefore that additional external monitoring need not be required.
- 4.3 Following this advice, the Authority completed further investigations including discussions with the Eastern Rivers Ski Club and individual water skiers. This identified the historic level of use (last five years) and was compared with potential use given the agreed tide restrictions, and an assumed factor to take account of adverse weather conditions.
- 4.4 The identified potential use is approximately 50% of the previous reported level of activity. Additionally, the agreed trial zone is also recognised as being a 59% reduction on the area which has previously been used for the activity. In the light of this, and additional control measures including year round patrolling, and requiring all skiers to book on with Broads Control, as well as applying the standard suite of conditions which apply to waterskiing generally, officers have concluded that there is no likely significant adverse effect on the interest features of the site. An updated report has therefore been submitted to Natural England for their consideration.

5 Port Marine Safety Code: Development of the Safety Management System

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Steve Birtles/NA4

- 5.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013, the Authority formally reviewed the arrangements relating to the Designated Person and confirmed that the level of independent assurance is appropriate to comply with the Port Marine Safety Code.
- 5.2 The Authority also adopted the updated Safety Management System and supported the ongoing development of detailed supporting operational procedures.

6 Broads Climate Change Adaptation Plan

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Simon Hooton/CC1-4

- 6.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013, the Authority received an update following the submission to Defra of a preliminary Climate Change Adaptation Plan in 2011. The Climate Change Adaptation Panel is guiding the development of a wider programme of stakeholder engagement to debate the issues and options for climate change adaptation in the Broads. The Panel has reiterated the need to work in partnership and retain an open and transparent process. The work with stakeholders needs to relate to their everyday needs and will inform a revised plan currently timetabled for submission to Defra in summer 2014.
- 6.2 Although there would be a widespread initial programme of information giving and awareness raising, the intention will be to take a steady approach to the more detailed discussion phase. This will allow a suitable depth of contact to draw out useful information. It will start with stakeholder groups and gradually increase the range of contacts and levels of engagement. Having said this, it is hoped that requests from other stakeholder groups to be involved in discussions at these early stages would be followed up. The Panel is suggesting four phases to the work, starting from late spring 2013. Further information on the evolving work programme is contained in Appendix 2.
- 6.3 The finer details of the engagement programme will now be developed, and written up as a project brief to be agreed by the Adaptation Panel at their meeting on 9 April 2013.
- 7 Review of Consultative Arrangements and Community/Stakeholder Engagement Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Andrea Long/Nil
- 7.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013 the Authority considered the findings of the Review of Consultative Arrangements and Community/Stakeholder Engagement that had been taking place during 2012/13. The Authority noted the contents of the Final Report and endorsed the recommendations and actions (see Appendix 2). The Authority also agreed the revised Terms of

Reference for the Broads Forum. Full details can be found on the Authority's website.

8 Equalities

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Sarah Endersby/Nil

- 8.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013 the Authority adopted an Equality Policy and was briefed on further work that was being undertaken to ensure that the Authority complies in full with the Equality Act 2010. The Equality Policy is intended to assist the Authority in putting into practice its commitment to provide equality and avoid unlawful discrimination in all areas of employment and service provision.
- 8.2 The Policy applies to all individuals associated with the Authority as either a member, employee (current, prospective or previous) or volunteer. It provides guidance primarily but not exclusively intended for officers in complying with good practice when dealing with service users in person, through electronic means, over the telephone or in writing. It also sets out a process for dealing with complaints and disputes, which could result in disciplinary action being taken against staff in certain circumstances. This is backed up by the Code of Conduct for Employees.
- 8.3 However this remedy is not available for members, and the existing Code of Conduct for Members, adopted by the Authority in May 2012, makes no reference to the key principles enshrined in the legislation - that members should treat other persons equally and with respect, and should not engage in any forms of discrimination, harassment or victimisation against others (whether or not related to the protected characteristics). The Authority therefore agreed to review and update the Code of Conduct for Members to allow a revised Code to be considered by the Authority at its next meeting in May 2013.

9 Review of Terms of Reference of Committees

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: John Organ/Nil

9.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013 the Authority agreed proposed changes to the Authority's Terms of Reference of Committees, including those for the Navigation Committee to ensure that the wording concerning the powers reserved to the Navigation Committee 1(1) particularly (ii) (a) – (g) was exactly the same as that in the Norfolk and Suffolk Broads Act 1988 as amended by the 2009 Act http://www.broads-authority.gov.uk/authority/meetings/constitution-documents.html

10 Timetable of Meetings Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: John Organ/Nil

10.1 At its meeting on 22 March 2013 the Authority agreed the meeting timetable for the period July 2013 to July 2014. In addition to the already scheduled Navigation Committee meeting on 6 June 2013, Navigation Committee

meetings have been scheduled for 5 September 2013, 24 October 2013, 12 December 2013, 27 February 2014, 24 April 2014 and 5 June 2014.

- **11 Department for Transport Funding for Cycling in National Parks** Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Adrian Clarke/TR1-2
- 11.1 The Department for Transport (DfT) is inviting Local Authorities, in partnership with National Parks, to bid for a cycle grant to support improvements in cycling infrastructure to enable people to cycle in and around National Parks.
- 11.2 The Authority is working with Norfolk County Council to look at the proposals in the Three Rivers Way (3RW) project and particularly the elements of the scheme that link Hoveton with Horning and just possibly Horning with Ludham Bridge.
- 11.3 It is considered that the 3RW meets the aims of the Integrated Access Strategy as it provides links between public transport facilities (Wroxham Station and various bus stops), cycle hire facilities at Horning and a range of destinations and facilities that visitors to the Broads value. The scheme would also improve safety for travel to school and to local facilities and provide improved opportunities for boaters to access the villages in the area from existing moorings.
- 11.4 Norfolk County Council is considering what it can offer in terms of match funding by way of offering land as well as a contribution from existing budgets over two years. It is likely that if a viable scheme is designed, the Council would look for an additional contribution from the Broads Authority.
- 11.5 It should be noted that competition for funding will be high and the timescale for putting together bids for funding, including demonstrating that match funding is available, is quite tight. Additionally there are further factors that will be considered by the DfT when applications are determined. These include detailed consideration of the strategic, economic, financial, economic and deliverability cases put forward by scheme applicants. A Sustrans run seminar in March 2013 helped to explain the likely judging criteria.

12 Hire Boat Tolls

12.1 Following representations from the Broads Hire Boat Federation concerning difficult trading conditions experienced by operators and cash flow problems, the Authority has agreed to reschedule the payments for hire boat tolls for one year only because of the exceptional circumstances so that they can be paid in the following manner:

1 April – $1/6^{th}$ 1 May – $1/6^{th}$ 1 June $1/6^{th}$ 1 July the balance of $\frac{1}{2}$

subject to:

- (1) the payments being made in a timely manner to avoid the Tolls Team wasting time chasing payments;
- (2) those members of BHBF who choose to use Hoseasons to pay the Tolls on their behalf instructing the agent to pay 50% immediately and 50% on 1 July.

The Authority will review the payment schedule for next year in the Autumn as part of the normal Tolls process when the performance from this year's season is clear.

13 Navigation Patrolling and Performance Targets

Contact Officer/Broads Plan Objective: Adrian Vernon/NA4.3

13.1 The figures for February and March (Appendix 3) reflect the poor weather but during that time a large amount of training and practical work has been undertaken. On 18 March the summer seasonal staff returned and the team now comprises of ten full-time plus seven summer seasonal rangers including two new full-time rangers (one who has previously been a seasonal ranger) and two new seasonal rangers (one who has been a volunteer and the other who has been a volunteer and a part season ranger covering sickness). The new staff are undergoing intensive training before being signed off as authorised to conduct their full range of duties.

14 Sunken and Abandoned Vessel Update

14.1 The small cruiser sunk at Beccles shown in the last report has now been raised by the owner. A verbal update will be given regarding the raising of the sailing vessel in Oulton Broad and the cruiser at Beccles both of which should have been dealt with by then. Outline of the Next Phase of Stakeholder Engagement over Climate Change for the Broads

What are we talking about?

- A 12(-18) month project to engage with key stakeholders in the Broads to help them look ahead on how to cope with a changing climate
- A partnership approach led by the Broads Authority but closely allied with statutory authorities and with the open support of other organisations
- Developing an agreed picture of what climate implications lie ahead for the Broads
- Creating a framework for change to get the best for the Broads as the coping range for the climate alters

Who are the initial targeted stakeholders?

- Parish councils: the democratic representatives of our communities
- Business especially farmers/landowners/ land managers and those that use the land and water they manage
- Young people aged ~17 to 25: as they are the people who will need to particularly cope differently
- The project would use the Broads Forum as a touchstone and could seek to tap into the Broads Society (helping them reach into new areas and fostering a strong community perspective)

What would we do?

- First phase: information sharing (months 1 to 6)
 - Building awareness of our interest in working with the targeted stakeholders and why action is needed
 - Sharing what is known about the likely climate changes and how they impact on the special qualities of the Broads and the things people do
- Second phase: working with stakeholders on understanding and reviewing the implications (months 3 to 9)
 - Using existing methodology explore predicted implications to understand likely change to the special features within the Broads
 - Revise understanding with the benefit of different perspectives (or confirm content through those different perspectives)
 - Gather thoughts on what information is still needed to help choices what would be the research and data collection priorities in the short and medium terms
 - Start identifying options to cope with, and get the best from, those changes
- Third phase devising a framework for change (months 7 to 12)
 - Exploring what would need to alter to keep the Broads special
 - Identifying how the alterations/adaptations could happen
 - Identifying the timescale of various actions

- Fourth phase publishing a plan (months 11 to 15)
 - Agreeing a plan of action for the Broads and making it widely available. This action is likely to include undertaking new research, collecting more data, developing new policies and governance routes, designing and implementing small scale adaptation project, engaging in wider and more specific dialogue
 - Establishing a way forward to enable the plan to be helpful

How would this be accomplished?

- Identify a project leader and commit the time to it
- Establish a strategic reference group to support the lead and build collective ownership of the way forward
- Identify sufficient supporting cash/resources from a range of sources
- Agree a reporting back mechanism to keep the process open and transparent
- Create a small internal working team
- Bring in other expertise when required and to ensure understanding and learning is shared internally as well
- Develop good but simple supporting material
- Reach out to the targeted participants by looking to meet them in their locality and at times convenient to them
- Seek to record the engagement process as it proceeds to help involve people and monitor changes in attitude
